Annual International course

Qualitative Methods for Health Research & Medical Discourse Analysis

Course objectives

This course is organized by Institute for Research & Development with the collaboration of Institute of Psychiatry as part of the capacity building among young researchers initiative. It will be held annually as an event for researchers from Sri Lanka and the wider South Asian region to gain knowledge in qualitative research, but will be open to participants from any part of the world.

This three day course aims to provide students with an understanding of the purpose and appropriate use of qualitative research methods and to equip them with the basic skills to design and conduct qualitative research in the field of health.

Different theoretical approaches to data collection and analysis will be explained and explored, including the Grounded Theory approach and Interpretative Phenomenological Analysis. Methods to be described will include in depth interviews, focus group discussions, and participant observation. Using qualitative data analysis software will be also looked at. Students will be encouraged to develop qualitative study ideas throughout the course period among themselves, and the tutors will provide advice and feedback on their ideas.

Participants

The course is suitable for all levels of health researchers interested in conducting qualitative research but lack adequate training in the subject. However, we encourage people from diverse disciplines (Medicine, Psychology, Anthropology, Biology, Education, etc) to take part in the course to learn skills on how to work in a multi-disciplinary research environment.

Dr. Tine Van Bortel (MA, MSc, MPhil, PhD) - Institute of Psychiatry, King's College London

Tine has an interdisciplinary background in qualitative social sciences & health, medical humanities, cultural studies, development studies and a UNICEF certificate in global child health & wellbeing. She is also a qualified and registered coach, counsellor and therapist working with clinical and non-clinical populations to promote individual and organisational wellbeing and prevent ill health. She undertook her multidisciplinary education and training at the Universities of Leuven (Belgium), Ghent (Belgium), Glasgow (UK) and King's College London (UK). She has been a research assistant in qualitative social sciences and medical humanities at the University of Glasgow (UK); a-translational research fellow with a Heymans Public Engagement grant at the University of Ghent (Belgium); and a scientific coordinator and senior researcher on two large-scale multisite global mental health projects at King's College London (UK) which the is currently completing.

She currently sits as internal examiner on the exam board of the MSc in Mental Health Services & Population Research at King's College London and supervises several MSc students in Mental Health Studies, Organisational Psychiatry & Psychology, Global Health & Velopment, and Mental Health Social Work with Children & Adults.
