Athula Sumathipala is a professor of Psychiatry and a consultant psychiatrist. Athula's research interests are centred on inter-connected disciplines; the epidemiology of chronic disease and multi-morbidity, especially physical and mental illness combinations; evaluation and implementation of complex interventions; using twin methods in the study of illness aetiology; and, ethics related to research. Athula is a cofounder of the Institute for Research & Development (IRD) in Sri Lanka (www.ird.lk) and the Sri Lankan Twin Registry; one of the few large scale functioning population based registries for twin and genetic research in a lowand middle-income countries (LMIC). Athula co-leads the Mental Health Research Group in the Research Institute.

Dr. Nathan Davies

Senior Research Fellow



Nathan Davies is Senior Research Fellow and an Alzheimer's Society Junior Fellow. Nathan leads a team and portfolio of research on dementia. He has an interest in improving the support that family carers receive when caring for someone with dementia, particularly at the end of life. Nathan's current work has developed a decision tool for practitioners making end of life decisions and a support website for family carers.
